Community Health

Early Childhood Home Visiting

- Maternal Infant Early Childhood Healthy Families America Home Visiting Program (MIECHV) received national accreditation from Healthy Families America
- 1,094 home visits were completed

Baby & Me Tobacco Free

- 71 new clients enrolled
- 70% of clients who delivered had babies 5.5 lbs or more and 37 weeks gestation or greater

Maternal Depression Network

- 1,988 women screened in total
- 394 scored high enough for referral
- 47% accepted referral

Personal Responsibility Education Program

- 14 staff members from partner agencies trained
- 11 youth classes held by partner agencies, with 64 youth participants

Cribs for Kids

- 400 Pack-n-Plays distributed

One Life

- Provided evidence based prevention programming to 743 youth and young adults
- Performed 161 HIV tests and 132 HCV tests
- Continuation funding received from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration to continue to build capacity

Policy/Chronic Disease

- Tobacco 21 ordinances adopted in six communities, covering over 50% of tobacco retailers in the county.
- Akron Bike Share program was expanded
- Complete Streets planning continued
- Education for healthcare practices in eliminating healthcare disparities
- Client Choice food pantries

WIC

- 9,236 women, Infants and children enrolled
- 39,113 clinic visits
- 3,049 referrals made for other services
- 1,792 pregnant women screened for substance abuse
- 2,560 postpartum women screened for depression
- 65% of postpartum women initiated breastfeeding
- 800 families participated in the Farmers' Market Program (twice the number of families in 2017)

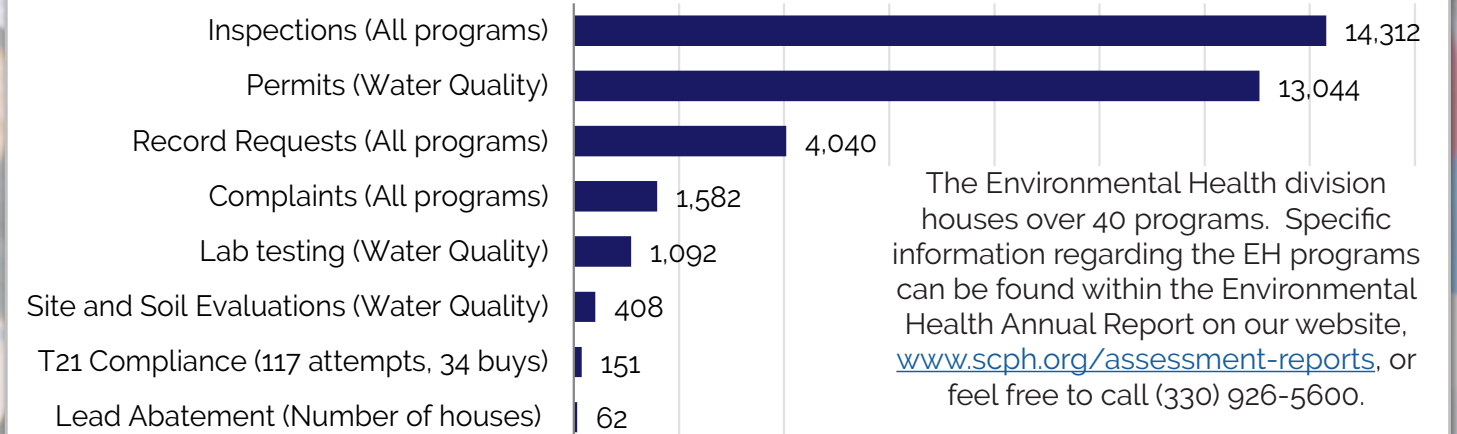
Epidemiology/Informatics

In 2018, we built on the success of our "data dashboards," which allows website visitors to create customized reports using the latest public health data. A new data partnership with Infoline allowed us to create a countywide interactive asset map. We aim to make local and statewide data more accessible to the public on various topics such as births and deaths, emergency room overdoses, communicable diseases, influenza, community census profiles, and more. Other projects include GIS story maps, data briefs, and multiple reports, including the Community Health Assessment, Community Health Improvement Plan and the SCPH Strategic Plan. Communicable Disease

Communicable disease cases reported in 2018: **7,111**

Top five reported diseases:

- 1) Chlamydia infection: 3,365
- 2) Gonococcal infection: 1,094
- 3) Influenza-associated hospitalization: 996
- 4) Hepatitis C, chronic infection: 651
- 5) Hepatitis B, chronic infection: 108

Total outbreaks investigated in 2018: 14

- Influenza: 8
- Norovirus: 3
- Pertussis: 1
- Mushroom poisoning: 1
- Cyclospora: 1

Tuberculosis: 27 suspected cases were investigated, 14 of which were confirmed

Enteric illnesses: 341 cases were reported and investigated by CDU staff

Hepatitis A: In response to the statewide outbreak, 106 hepatitis A and B vaccines were administered to members of high risk groups.
