


Summit County Public Health Influenza Surveillance Report

2020 - 2021 Season







Summit County Surveillance Data:

During Week 20 of influenza surveillance, influenza-related activity was minimal in Summit County. Although COVID-19 activity continues to decrease, it still remains high with continued elevated risk of community exposure.

Note: Data is provisional and may be updated as more information is received. Percentages should be interpreted with caution. Small changes in number can result in large changes in percent. When a percentage, or prevalence, is available in this table, the percent change will be calculated from those values

Lab reports: During the Week 19, reporting Summit County facilities ordered 512 influenza tests, none of which had a positive result. 1,760 COVID-19 tests were completed by reporting partners, with a positivity rate of 5.6% in Week 20 (a 17% decrease from Week 19) (Fig. 4)

Note: Influenza and COVID-19 testing data are collected from selected reporting partners and do not represent positivity rates for the entire county.

Acute Care Hospitalizations: There was zero reported influenza and 104 COVID-19 admissions during Week 20. Figure 2 displays hospitalizations in Summit County.

Pharmacies: Zero prescriptions for CDC- approved influenza antiviral medications were reported during Week 20.

School absenteeism includes absences regardless of reason. In Week 20, the absence rate was 6.2%. This was 12% higher than the rate reported in Week 19.


Zero deaths related to influenza, 31 COVID-19 deaths and 22 pneumonia related deaths were reported during Wk 20. The rates of pneumonia deaths increased by 45.7% and the COVID-19 associated death rate increased by 18.5%.

Figure 1 displays weekly counts of deaths occurring in Summit County associated with pneumonia, COVID-19 and influenza.



Figure 1. Weekly Summit County death counts associated with pneumonia and influenza during 2020-2021 season




Hospitalizations: Summit County hospitals reported no influenza-associated hospitalizations, and 104 COVID-19 admissions in Week 20. Figure 2 displays weekly confirmed hospitalization counts for Summit County (influenza total count to date = 1).



ESSENCE (Electronic Surveillance System for the Early Notification of Community-based Epidemics) is a web-based disease surveillance information system that lets agencies analyze events of public health interest, monitor healthcare data for events that could affect public health. For this report, ED visits related to respiratory complaints and fever / ILI are included. **Figure 3** displays the weekly number of ER visits related to ILI and flu symptoms in Summit County. There were 147 ILI-related visits reported during Week 20, which was 3.2% of total ED visits (n = 4611). This rate was 89% higher than the ILI rate during Week 19. *This increase is partially due to a new facility reporting to ESSENCE, this facility does not report the age or age range of the patient.*

Ohio Influenza Activity: from the Ohio Department of Health:

Current Ohio Activity Level (Geographic Spread) - Minimal

During MMWR Week 7, public health surveillance data sources indicate minimal intensity for influenza-like illness (ILI) in outpatient settings reported by Ohio's sentinel providers. Data from public health and clinical laboratories show very low levels of influenza virus circulation. Week 7 syndromic emergency department data is delayed as Ohio finalizes the transition between syndromic surveillance data vendors. Reported cases of influenza-associated hospitalizations are below the seasonal threshold*. There were 11 influenza-associated hospitalizations reported during MMWR Week 7.

Ohio Surveillance Data:

- The Ohio Department of Health Laboratory has tested 11 specimens for influenza during the 2020-2021 influenza season; of these, 0 tested positive for influenza A(H1N1pdm09), 0 for influenza A(H3N2), 1 for influenza A (not subtyped), 0 for influenza B, and 10 were negative (through 2/20/2021).
- The National Respiratory and Enteric Virus Surveillance System (NREVSS) and U.S. World Health Organization (WHO) Collaborating Laboratories reported 25,967 tests for influenza performed at participating facilities; of these, 0 tested positive for influenza A(H1N1pdm09), 2 for influenza A(H3N2), 33 for influenza A (subtyping not performed), and 18 for influenza B (through 02/13/2021; 2020-2021 season positive influenza testing data reflects a two-week lag to ensure data completeness).
- No pediatric influenza-associated mortalities have been reported so far during the 2020-2021 influenza season (through 2/20/2021).
- No novel influenza A virus infections have been reported so far during the 2020-2021 influenza season (through 2/20/2021).
- Incidence of confirmed influenza-associated hospitalizations in 2020-2021 season = 92 (through 2/20/2021).


National Surveillance: from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

Seasonal influenza activity in the United States remains lower than usual for this time of year.

National Outpatient Illness Surveillance:

During week 7, the percentage of outpatient visits for ILI remained at 1.0% (Figure 5), which is below the national baseline of 2.6%. During week 7, compared with week 6, the percentage of visits for ILI increased for one region (Region 6), decreased for two regions (Regions 2 and 4), and remained stable (change of \leq 0.1%) in the remaining seven regions. All regions reported percentages of outpatient visits for ILI below their region-specific baselines. In Week 7, all reporting states & territories experienced minimal activity as reported by sentinel ILINet providers (Fig. 6).

Global Surveillance:

Influenza Update N° 387, World Health Organization (WHO), published 15 February 2021, based on data up to 31 January 2021. The Update is published every two weeks.


Summary

The current influenza surveillance data should be interpreted with caution as the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has influenced to varying extents health seeking behaviours, staffing/routines in sentinel sites, as well as testing priorities and capacities in Member States. The various hygiene and physical distancing measures implemented by Member States to reduce SARS-CoV-2 virus transmission have likely played a role in reducing influenza virus transmission.

- Globally, despite continued or even increased testing for influenza in some countries, influenza activity remained at lower levels than expected for this time of the year.
- In the **temperate zone of the northern hemisphere**, influenza activity remained below baseline, though sporadic detections of influenza A and B viruses were reported in some countries.
- In the temperate zone of the southern hemisphere, influenza activity was reported at inter-seasonal level.
- In the Caribbean and Central American countries, no influenza detections were reported. Severe acute respiratory infection (SARI) activity increased in some reporting country.
- In tropical South America, there were no influenza detections reported in this period.
- In tropical Africa, influenza activity continued to be reported in Western Africa.
- In Southern Asia, sporadic influenza detections were reported across reporting countries.
- In South East Asia, influenza detections were reported in Lao People's Democratic Republic (PDR).
- Worldwide, influenza B detections accounted for the majority of the very low numbers of detections reported.

• National Influenza Centres (NICs) and other national influenza laboratories from 86 countries, areas or territories reported data to FluNet for the time period from 18 January 2021 to 31 January 2021 (data as of 2021-02-12 08:13:33 UTC). The WHO GISRS laboratories tested more than 220860 specimens during that time period. A total of 565 specimens were positive for influenza viruses, of which 107 (18.9%) were typed as influenza A and 458 (81.1%) as influenza B. Of the sub-typed influenza A viruses, 21 (38.2%) were influenza A(H1N1)pdm09 and 34 (61.8%) were influenza A(H3N2). Of the characterized B viruses, 1 (0.3%) belonged to the B-Yamagata lineage and 314 (99.7%) to the B-Victoria lineage.

About this report: Reporting agencies include labs, hospitals, long-term care and community-based care providers, physician offices, university clinic, pharmacies, and schools. Agencies are distributed throughout Summit County and report different indicators of flu activity including total lab tests, numbers of positive tests and type, antiviral prescriptions filled, school absences, and influenza like illness (ILI). Hospitalizations are lab confirmed for influenza and are obtained from the Ohio Disease Reporting System. Number of deaths associated with influenza and pneumonia are gathered from the Summit County Office of Vital Records death listings. Emergency room visits for complaints related to influenza are obtained by syndromic surveillance system (Epicenter).

Special thanks to all agencies who report Influenza related data weekly.
